- Take the kids on a walk. Bring a camera along to take pictures of interesting plants, trees, birds and bugs. Just keep in mind that reading and researching of any kind is better than none, so if your child a topic that isn't 'educational' as you'd like, they will still be learning and engaging their minds.
 - If you're planning a vacation, let the kids plan a day. Have them research museums, parks or attractions in the area of your destination. They can help you find directions and figure out how much it will cost to get in. Take a camera (if permitted) for lots of pictures and when you get home, make a scrapbook, complete with ticket stubs and journal entries of what they liked the best.
 - Use the nice weather to move some of those 'messier' science projects outdoors. Recipes for erupting volcanoes or cornstarch quicksand can be found online, along with explanations for how they work. Have your child study the project, and prepare a presentation. Then, he can teach you what he's learned while he does the experiment.

Just A Reminder:

Bills are due on the 15th of each month. We pre-bill each month. This means the bill you receive around the first of June is for services for the month of June, with the exception of toll calls. Toll charges usually show up on your bill about 1 month behind.

If we have not received payment by the 15th of the month, a late notice is issued, with approximately 1 week grace period, before services are suspended. If services are suspended, there is a \$24 reconnect charge to have the services re-established. This goes for any HTC account whether it is phone only, phone and DSL, or DSL only.

To help prevent any disruptions in service, please pay your account on or before the 15th of each month. If you cannot pay on or before the 15th, please contact one of our offices to make arrangements before the cut-off day. By making arrangements prior to your services being suspended, you can save the cost of the reconnect fees.
